Dear ACO Friends,

It is my pleasure to share with you our 2019 Annual Report. It was an amazing year on many levels, but overall what is most important are the families that were served. Such as the moms and dads who slept knowing that they would keep a roof over their heads. And, the children who went to bed each night with full tummies and groceries for the next day's meals. It was the struggling single moms who needed guidance to better their education to secure a better paying job and the student who needed ACO's help receiving their GED after they dropped out of school because they couldn't fit the traditional classroom learning styles. What was important was the new school supplies and backpacks that ACO provided to the grandchildren because their grandparents were raising them on their limited income. What was most important were the families we saved from hunger and homelessness by providing a path to financial stability.

2019 was my first year serving as Chief Executive Officer. Though I joined the ACO team in 2001 as Director of Volunteer Services and served in several capacities including Chief Operating Officer before moving into this office. In my years with the organization, I have never been as proud and honored to be a part of such an amazing mission and group leading the cause. Our staff strengthened and focused on community development and our Board of Directors took an active role in leadership support and development. Taking a bold step in 2019, our leaders made the change of our name from Allen Community Outreach to ALL COMMUNITY OUTREACH to better reflect what we were already doing, which is serving all Collin County neighbors. You will see the gradual shift from only "Allen" in our name to "All" as we move into 2020. Allen remains our home base, and our support base that we are so grateful for.

I saw ACO take a turn to a positive new approach as we celebrated our first full year serving clients with the "Working Families Success Model" which is based on a nationally-proven program from the Annie E. Casey Foundation. In addition to addressing immediate needs of Collin County families, our case workers are sharing resources and a team approach to set them on a path for independence and financial security.

Thanks to donations from our community, ACO continues to provide quality selections of fresh foods to families facing hunger. By providing a shopping experience at the ACO Food Pantry, parents can best choose the foods they need and want to prepare for their children. No cardboard box of stables is simply handed out to people standing in line. With a cart and a supermarket atmosphere, ACO has available dairy and fresh produce, frozen meats and a variety of options for health and cultural needs. Donations of clothing and household items make shopping a breeze for families in need of clothes for work and school. They are given a gift card to shop at our resale stores to choose not only clothing, but furniture, small appliances and other much needed items. None of this would be possible without gently used donations made at our processing center, local food drives and community partnerships.

Struggles continue in Collin County. As much as we would like, we haven't worked ourselves out of our jobs-YET. And, as many think there is no poverty in Collin County, we see it each day. As our programs and services expand, the need for assistance continues to increase and more families from all over the county come through our doors. We will continue our mission each day to end poverty in our communities, one neighbor at a time.

Thank you for joining hands with ACO to provide hope and help, and support our mission.

In addition to the services offered through Income Support, with generous help from the community, ACO is able to provide seasonal special programs for economically disadvantaged children and help them get ready to start school.






FILL THE BUS: SCHOOL SUPPLIES DRIVE






